The Eastern Contra Costa Transit Authority (ECCTA) meeting was called to order in the ECCTA Board Room, 801 Wilbur Avenue, Antioch, California by Chair Gene Clare at 4:00 P.M.

PUBLIC COMMENT

CHAIR'S REPORT

Chair Clare reported that the ECCTA meeting scheduled for Wednesday, October 22, 2014 at 4:00 P.M. had been cancelled, to be rescheduled for Wednesday, October 29, 2014 at 11:00 A.M. to allow the presentation of the Small Transit System of the Year award, with an accompanying celebration with staff.

Chair Clare also reported that September 4 would be Chief Executive Officer (CEO) Jeanne Krieg's birthday. The Board serenaded Ms. Krieg with a Happy Birthday.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER'S REPORT

A. Operations Report

CEO Jeanne Krieg advised that the new fiscal year had started and there was not much to report other than all operational and financial measurements were as expected. She reported that month-to-month ridership on fixed route had increased this July in comparison with July last year with potentially another record breaking year, although the ridership on one route, Route 386 to Discovery Bay, was being monitored because it was very low despite repeated marketing programs.

Ms. Krieg also reported that Contra Costa 511 was offering free transit tickets to students in Grades 5-12 and a flyer describing the program was in the Board packets. There was nothing new to report on the route redesign project although there was now a direct feed into Tri Delta Transit's system data which included on/off data counts to analyze what was going on in the system, using data collected by the Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) during their system survey in May. The next visible step would be the public outreach and schedule of meetings in mid-October.

Ms. Krieg described a new project that would allow Dial-a-Ride passengers to use on-line services to book and cancel their trips. A test program would be instituted next month on a very limited basis to cancel trips and if successful would be expanded to on-line bookings. She added that Clipper was still slated for September 2015 and there had been lots of activity in preparation for the project; a Request for Proposal (RFP) had been published for a solar consultant for the Tri Delta Transit building; and an RFP for bus advertising would be published on September 8, 2014.

Ms. Krieg reiterated that plans were under way for a celebration of the Small Transit System of the Year award, scheduled to be presented to the Board on Wednesday, October 29, 2014 beginning with a Board meeting at 11:00 A.M. and moving outside for the presentation of the award by the President of the American Public Transportation Association (APTA). Invitations would also be mailed to past members of the Board along with politicians and others. A new logo, which was displayed in the Board Room, had been designed and banners would be placed throughout the building, and signs would be placed inside all buses. Ten of the buses would have wraps and the Tri Delta Transit website would have a new banner with the new logo.

Director Glover arrived at 4:08 P.M.

Ms. Krieg advised that staff was also working with the Seafood Festival Committee on the shuttle service; Tri Delta Transit would be staffing a booth at the Brentwood Art & Wine Festival at the Streets of Brentwood this coming weekend; and 332 summer youth pass wristbands had been sold, a record for the seven years of the program.

ACTION AND DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. RM2 Grant to Interface with MTC's 511 System

Ms. Krieg explained that ECCTA's real time bus information system, which had been purchased from Connexionz, allowed passengers to retrieve real time bus departure information from the Internet or from ECCTA's new smart phone mobile application. The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) used a proprietary interface software for the regional 511 system making it impossible to interface ECCTA's system with MTC's system. ECCTA had received a quote from Connexionz for \$30,000 to write the interface. MTC had offered an RM2 grant of \$30,000 to pay for the necessary interface which would allow ECCTA's real-time bus information to be available on the regional 511 system.

Ms. Krieg recommended that the Board adopt Resolution 140827a authorizing the CEO to execute an allocation with MTC in the amount of \$30,000 to allow ECCTA's system to be part of the regional 511 system.

B. Title VI. Limited English Proficiency, Equal Employment Opportunity, and **Environmental Justice Policies**

Ms. Krieg advised that ECCTA must adopt system-wide policies necessary to guard against discriminatory practices or decisions in compliance with Title VI. Limited English Proficiency, Equal Employment Opportunity, and Environmental Justice policies.

Chief Operating Officer (COO) Steve Ponte, the official Title VI Officer, explained that Title VI was intended to make sure that all individuals were treated equally. Limited English Proficiency guarded against discriminatory practices or decisions based on the inability to speak English not well or not at all; Equal Employment Opportunity guarded against the discriminatory hiring practices by ECCTA or any of ECCTA's subcontractors based on race, ethnicity, creed, color, physical, mental disability, medical condition, marital status, age, or sexual orientation; and Environmental Justice guarded against discriminatory practices or decisions based on low income or poverty level income.

Ms. Krieg recommended the adoption of Resolution 140827b which adopts ECCTA's Title VI. Limited English Proficiency, Equal Employment Opportunity, and Environmental Justice policies that guard against discriminatory practices or decisions.

C. Procurement Authority

Ms. Krieg explained that the Chief Executive Officer's procurement authority of \$10,000 had not been increased since 2005, and ECCTA's financial auditor had recommended a review of ECCTA's procurement authority levels with a goal of expediting purchases and She noted that the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) increasing efficiency. procurement guidelines considered a small purchase anything under \$100,000. While not desiring such a high procurement level, she recommended that in order to become more effective in procurements, the CEO's procurement authority be increased to \$24,999, with anything over \$25,000 to follow a formal procurement process and Board approval. She reiterated that the policy remained the same, only the authority level would change.

Ms. Krieg recommended the adoption of Resolution 140827c establishing the CEO's procurement authority level at \$24,999.

BOARD OF DIRECTORS COMMENTS

Director Gray reported that he would attend the Brentwood Art & Wine Festival at the Streets of Brentwood this weekend; he distributed notices to identify the Blues Festival in Antioch on September 14, 2014, an event that had been ongoing for the last ten years; and stated he would participate in bocce ball playoffs tonight.

Director Guise also reported on the Brentwood Art & Wine Festival at the Streets of Brentwood this weekend.

Director Johnson proudly described his grandson's feat that had earned him the Varsity Football Player of the Week status at his High School in Juliette, Tennessee.

Director Rocha called attention to that fact that the day of the next Board meeting on September 24, 2014, the Association of Bay Area Governments (ABAG) would be hosting a Water Conference at the Antioch Community Center from 9:00 A.M. to 12:30 P.M. Everyone was invited to attend.

Director Harper commented that he had asked a Tri Delta Transit van driver if she was part of the best Small Transit System in the country, and he reported that she had enthusiastically responded that she was. He also reported that eight new businesses were opening in Antioch and a ribbon cutting ceremony had been scheduled for this Saturday in honor of those openings. He was pleased to see more activity in the Antioch Downtown.

Director Parent reported that August 28 would be the final Culinary Crawl in Pittsburg and it would be opened up to 300 participants; Thursday would be the grand opening of the Hall of Fame Restaurant/Sports Bar with an emphasis on Puerto Rican food; and the Seafood Festival would be on the weekend of September 6. Tickets were still available for the Zinfandel Dinner on Friday night catered by Scotts; there were 90 entrants in the Zinfandel competition this year, a benefit for the Pittsburg Arts and Community

Foundation, to be at the waterfront where the Seafood Festival would also be located. All were welcome.

Chair Clare reported that the City of Brentwood was in the midst of hiring a new City Manager.



Background

The Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC) entered into a contract with Cubic Transportation Systems for Clipper, the automated fare payment system in the San Francisco Bay Area. Under the contract, Cubic operates and maintains the Clipper system through November 2, 2019. ACTransit, Golden Gate Transit, BART, SF MUNI, SamTrans, VTA, CalTrain, and WETA entered into a Clipper MOU to identify their obligations relative to the implementation, operation, maintenance of the Clipper program.

The MOU permits MTC to accept additional Bay Area transit operators into the Clipper system by way of a supplemental agreement with MTC on behalf of the Clipper operators. MTC has implemented a plan to install Clipper on Tri Delta Transit in late 2015. The next step in this process is adoption of a resolution agreeing to the terms of the Clipper MOU supplemental agreement. The Supplemental Agreement will be available at the board meeting.

Requested Action

Adopt Resolution 140924a authorizing the CEO to sign the Supplemental Agreement to the Clipper Memorandum of Understanding, agreeing to be bound by the terms and conditions of the MOU.

RESOLUTION AGREEING TO TERMS OF CLIPPER® MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING SUPPLEMENTAL AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, Clipper[®] is an automated fare payment system for intra- and interoperator transit trips in the San Francisco Bay Area that has been implemented and is currently being operated on Operators' transit systems; and

East County Emergency Fire Response and Prevention Assessment

East Contra Costa Fire Protection District proposes to levy a fire suppression assessment on all properties within the district's boundaries. The assessment will generate revenue to allow ECCFPD to operate five district fire stations (numbers 52, 59, 93, 54 and 94) with forty-eight operational personnel and two administrative personnel, and fund Cal Fire staff at the Sunshine Station beyond the state-supported fire season. The assessment revenue will enable ECCFPD to maintain fire suppression and fire prevention services and response times for fire emergency calls and avoid fire station closures and firefighter layoffs. This local funding source cannot be taken by the state or county and is to be reviewed annually by mandatory audits and an independent citizens' oversight committee.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE FIRE SUPPRESSION ASSESSMENT

On August 4, 2014, the Board of Directors of the East Contra Costa Fire Protection District voted to ask property owners to authorize the levy of a Fire Suppression Assessment. According to the engineer's report preliminarily approved by the District, the assessment would fund fire service by five District fire stations and one station staffed by the State's CalFire, rather than three District stations plus the one CalFire station.

Revenue Challenges Threaten Closure of Two East County Fire Stations

. East County property values fell during the recent recession and housing crisis. Property tax revenue for local fire and emergency response decreased 40%. In response, the East Contra Costa Fire Protection District made spending cuts including closing three fire stations, reducing the number of firefighter/EMTs and administrative staff, freezing salaries and requiring firefighter/EMTs to contribute as much as 25% of their salaries to cover pension costs. Some firefighter/EMTs have started to leave the District for more stable and better-paying jobs, requiring those who are left to cover open shifts.

When a temporary federal grant expires in November, 2014, the funding provided to operate two of the District's remaining five fire stations will stop. Under the District's adopted budgets, without access to new revenues, two of the District's five fire stations will close and 18 firefighter/EMT positions will be eliminated by December.

Slower Response Times Typically Mean Reduced Safety

If the District reduces from five to three stations, nine on-duty District firefighter/EMTs will serve East County's 249 square miles and more than 100,000 residents. As set forth in the assessment engineer's report, having three District fire stations to cover the Cities of Brentwood and Oakley, the Town of Discovery Bay, the communities of Byron, Bethel Island and Knightsen, the Marsh Creek/Morgan Territory area, and all other areas within unincorporated Contra Costa County to the east of Antioch and to the southeast of Clayton, will increase average emergency fire response times in the District.

Delays may compromise public safety in the event of brush and house fires that can double in size every 30 seconds. Firefighters may need to shift their emphasis from saving a home on fire to protecting neighboring houses from spreading fire. The District's ability to respond to multiple simultaneous fires may be especially hampered.

It Is Now Time To Decide

Property owners in the District are asked to submit a ballot indicating whether they support or oppose the proposed Fire Suppression Assessment to pay for the continued operation of two fire stations otherwise set to close by the end of November. If the District's property owners do not protest the assessment, the funds collected could only be used to fight and prevent fires in East County, and could not be taken by the state or federal governments or be used for any other purposes.

A YES mark on the enclosed ballot would support the District's fire suppression assessment to prevent closure of two out of five fire stations and allow the District to maintain a staff of 48 firefighters.

A NO mark on the enclosed ballot would oppose the District's fire suppression assessment, leading to the closure of two fire stations and elimination of 18 firefighter positions by the end of November.

How was the East Contra Costa Fire Protection District impacted by the recession?

The District relies primarily on property tax revenue to fund operations. The recent recession and associated decrease in local property values led to a 40% decrease in funding for 9-1-1 emergency fire response in East County.

Why is the District proposing this Fire Suppression Assessment?

A temporary federal grant that has kept two of our local fire stations open is set to expire on November 17, 2014. The grant cannot be renewed or extended. The Fire District has made numerous budget cuts and has evaluated all other available options for funding. Unless new revenue is secured between now and November, the District plans to close two local fire stations and 18 firefighter/EMT positions will be eliminated. This would leave 249 square miles in East County with three fire stations and nine District firefighter/EMTs on duty at any time.

What has the District done so far to live within its means?

The District has closed three of its original eight local fire stations; reduced fire suppression employees from 57 to 48; frozen salaries from 2007 until 2012; reduced administrative employees from 4 to 2; and sold surplus equipment. Additionally, local firefighter/EMTs contribute up to 25% of their salaries to pay for pensions and healthcare and are paid approximately 40% less than those in nearby fire departments. Further, the District has reduced the pension benefits new employees are entitled to receive upon retirement and extended the term of service required to qualify for pension benefits. In addition, the District no longer picks up any part of employee contributions to the pension system.

How would further service reductions impact emergency response times?

If two fire stations close and 18 firefighter/EMT positions are eliminated, 9-1-1 emergency fire response times to portions of East County could increase to 15 minutes or more. Fires can double in size every 30 seconds.

What would this Fire Suppression Assessment fund?

- Maintaining the number of on-duty firefighting personnel
- Preventing local fire stations closures

How can I be sure these funds will be spent wisely?

The proposed Fire Suppression Assessment would include fiscal accountability features, including:

- All funds can only be spent on fire suppression and prevention in East County
- No funds can be taken by the state or other agencies or be spent on any other purposes
- Annual audits and reports to the community

ASSESSMENT INFORMATION

Boundaries of the District: The Fire Suppression Assessment District is located in eastern Contra Costa County. The boundaries of the District include all property within the East Contra Costa Fire Protection District ("ECCFPD") boundary. A copy of the Assessment Diagram for the Fire Suppression Assessment District is included in the Engineer's Report, a copy of which is available at the office of the Secretary of the District or online at www.eccfpd.org.

Total Proposed Fiscal Year 2015/16 Maximum Assessment for the Entire District: \$4,074,209.70

Your Proposed Maximum Assessment for Fiscal Year 2015/16: The proposed maximum Fiscal Year 2015/16 assessment for your property is shown on the enclosed assessment ballot.

Duration of Proposed Assessment: The proposed assessment for the Fire Suppression Assessment District will be levied for a period of five years beginning with Fiscal Year 2015/16 and will continue through Fiscal Year 2019/20.

Cost of Living Inflator: The Maximum Fire Suppression Assessment is not subject to a cost of living inflator.

Reasons for the Proposed Assessment: The proposed assessment will generate revenue for ECCFPD to operate five fire stations (numbers 52, 59, 93, 54 and 94) with forty-eight operational personnel and two administrative personnel, along with funding Cal Fire staff at the Sunshine Station beyond the state-supported fire season.

Basis of Proposed Assessment: The method of apportionment of the proposed assessment is based upon the proportionate special benefit received from the services and conferred upon the property within the Fire Suppression Assessment District over and above the general benefit conferred upon the public at large. All assessable parcels within the proposed Fire Suppression Assessment District receive special and direct benefit from the services provided. Only parcels that receive direct special benefit are assessed, and each parcel is assessed in proportion to the estimated benefit received.

The factors which determine the proportional Fire Suppression Assessment for each parcel within the Fire Suppression Assessment District are Fire Flow (the amount of water available at a specific pressure to put out a fire, based on building square footage, existence of fire sprinklers and property use), Flow Duration (the number of hours Fire Flow is required, based on building square footage and property use) and Protection (determined by the distance each parcel is from a fire station and a fire hydrant). Adjustments are made for parcels in the Sunshine Station response area and wildland parcels in a State Responsibility Area.

A majority protest exists if the assessments represented by ballots submitted in opposition exceed those submitted in favor of the assessment. All returned ballots are tabulated and weighted according to the financial obligation of each particular parcel.
